

Capital Credits... an Investment in Your Future



It's well known that good plans lead to good decisions and good decisions lead to improved plans. And just as you and I must plan and budget our monthly living expenses along with our long-term financial fu-

tures, so does your electric cooperative.

A vital part of CAEC's sustainability and service goals is capital investments and improvements. Unlike investor-owned utilities that operate on profit goals designed to keep their stock strong, cooperatives such as yours, charge just enough to cover expenses and a sufficient margin to maintain a strong equity position. Equity is used to provide economic stability and meet the obligations of our lenders. It also represents the members' financial stake, or capital investment, in their cooperative.

Capital investments are made by investing a portion of the margins in infrastructure, such as poles, wire, buildings, trucks, etc. This reduces our need to borrow money required for system improvements. Currently we operate under an equity management plan the Board of Trustees adopted in 2004 to further balance the investments made through revenue and through debt by setting the cooperative's equity goal at 34 percent. Under this plan the members' investment is 34 percent of the capital, or facilities, with loans providing the remainder.

What does this mean for you, our members? CAEC's equity management plan guides your Board and staff in making decisions about plans, budget and rates. The cooperative must generate

adequate capital to fund growth and other needs without retaining member funds longer than is necessary or amounts in excess of its needs. Unique to cooperatives is the fact that each member who purchases service has an equity account, or capital credits, which tracks your investment in CAEC.

Those of you who were members in 1981 and/or 1982 will soon receive a capital credit check which represents the percentage of the cooperative you owned in a portion of one or both of those years. Why the dates 1981 and 1982? Because 30 years is the normal life expectancy for the infrastructure (poles, wire, transformers, etc.) of an electric distribution utility system. Therefore, capital credits are currently based on this time line.

The goal of our financial plan is aimed at ensuring our members pay only what is necessary while maintaining the strength and stability of your electric co-op. Each year, the plan is reviewed based on CAEC's financial condition and the economic outlook.

Project SHARE

A True Gift to Those in Need

It seems that everyone is trying to stretch a dollar right now—from gas to food prices, everything has increased and we all feel the pinch. But this influx of price increases not only affects you, but also the countless charities that help those in need.


One program in particular, Project SHARE, was launched Dec. 15, 1982, to provide emergency assistance to the elderly and disabled who need help with their energy bills. A joint effort between the American Red Cross and energy providers, such as CAEC, the program helps keep people warm during the winter and cool during the summer.

With prices skyrocketing, Project SHARE is finding more and more Alabamians who have to choose between their medication or food and their electricity, and fewer people donating to the program.

This situation can become life threatening, especially during the winter months, with some elderly and disabled who may reside in homes without adequate heat.

Each year in January, the Central Alabama American Red Cross allocates approximately \$50,000 to last through the winter for needy homes. These funds are typically depleted by March although the money does help to serve 450 families in Alabama. There are still more families in need—an estimated 10,000!

What can you do? Donate \$1, \$2, \$5 or any other whole-dollar amount on a monthly basis. CAEC members can support the Project SHARE program and the amount you select will be automatically added to your utility bill each month.

Not only does the program offer savings on many prescriptions, but members can receive discounts from businesses across the country and in their own backyard.

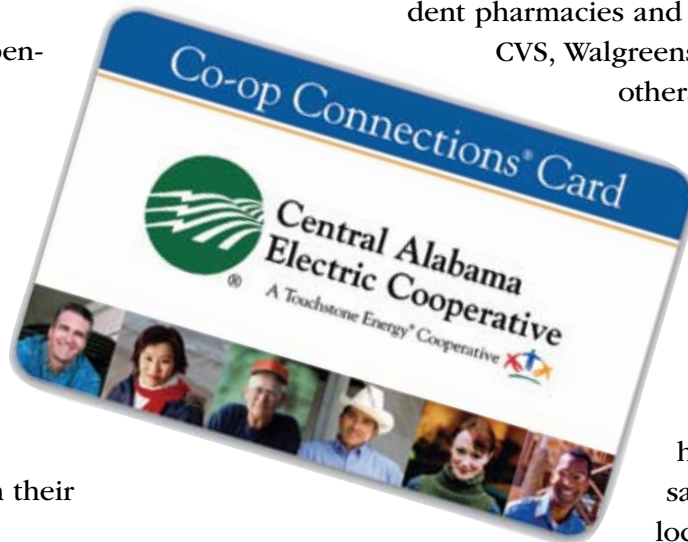

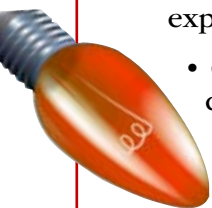
Keep the Holidays Safe and Bright Inside and Out!



Decorating your home for the holiday season is one of many great traditions. But an essential part of stringing the lights and putting up the tree is to keep electrical safety in mind. Here are simple tips that everyone can take to ensure a safe and happy holiday season.

- Avoid overloading electric circuits by verifying the limits of your fuse or circuit breaker panels to know what your home can safely handle.
- Don't connect too many strings of lights together and plug them into a single outlet.
- Make sure there's a bulb in each socket of your holiday lights. If a bulb is burned out, leave it in until you have a replacement. Immediately replace any broken bulbs that have exposed filaments.
 - Check for frayed, cracked insulation and damaged plugs on extension cords.
 - Never force a three-pronged plug into a two-hole outlet or extension cord.
- Don't run extension cords under rugs, around furniture legs or across doorways.
- Keep your natural tree well watered to prevent bulbs from igniting dry branches. Always check to make sure an artificial tree is nonflammable.
- Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, your home's walls or other firm supports using insulated staples, or run them through hooks to protect lights from wind damage. Do not nail, tack, pinch, nick or stress wiring.
- Outdoor lighting should have insulated electrical cords and be plugged into a Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter-protected receptacle only. Keep all plugs and connectors off the ground to help keep them away from water.


By following these tips, your holiday season can be safe and bright for the whole family! 



Cooking Up Electrical Savings

This time of year when family and friends gather, the kitchen really begins to heat up! Whether you're preparing a turkey or making cookies, here are some tips to help you be energy efficient - no matter what you're cooking!

- Develop the habit of "lids-on" cooking to permit lower temperature settings and keep the heat in your pots, not the kitchen.
- Keep reflector pans beneath stovetop heating elements bright and clean to utilize all of your oven's heating capabilities.
- Carefully measure water used for cooking to avoid heating more than is needed.
- Cook as much of the meal in the oven at one time as possible. Variations of 25°F still produce good results and save energy.
- Rearrange oven shelves before turning your oven on—and don't peek at food in the oven! Every time you open the oven door, 25° to 50°F is lost.
- There is no need to preheat the oven for broiling or roasting—that's just wasting electricity.
- Use your microwave oven whenever possible. It draws less than half the power of its conventional oven counterpart and cooks for a much shorter amount of time.
- Use the self-cleaning cycle only for major cleaning jobs and start the cycle right after cooking while the oven is still hot.

Remember, the kitchen is one of the most popular rooms of the house and even more so during the holidays. Following these tips not only help keep your electricity usage in check this time of year, but all year long!

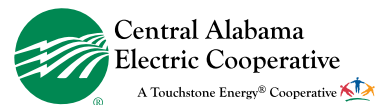
